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a specter lurks in the house of music and it goes by the name of race write ronald radano and philip bohlman in their introduction yet the intimate relationship between race and music has rarely been examined by contemporary scholars most of whom have abandoned it for the more enlightened notions of ethnicity and culture here a distinguished group of contributors confront the issue head on representing an unusually broad range of academic disciplines and geographic regions they critically examine how the imagination of race has influenced musical

production reception and scholarly analysis even as they reject the objectivity of the concept itself each essay follows the lead of the substantial introduction which reviews the history of race in european and american non western and global musics placing it within the contexts of the colonial experience and the more recent formation of world music offering a bold new revisionist agenda for musicology in a postmodern postcolonial world this book will appeal to students of culture and race across the humanities and social sciences

perhaps wrote ralph ellison more than seventy years ago the zoot suit contains profound political meaning perhaps the symmetrical frenzy of the lindy hop conceals clues to great potential power as ellison noted then many of our most mundane cultural forms are larger and more important than they appear taking on great significance and an unexpected depth of meaning what he saw in the power of the lindy hop the dance that life magazine once billed as america s true national folk dance would spread from black america to make a lasting impression on white america and offer us a truly compelling means of understanding our culture but with what hidden implications in american allegory black hawk hancock offers an embedded and embodied ethnography that situates dance within a larger chicago landscape of segregated social practices delving into two chicago dance worlds the lindy and steppin hancock uses a combination of participant observation and interviews to bring to the surface the racial tension that surrounds white use of black cultural forms focusing on new forms of appropriation in an era of multiculturalism hancock underscores the institutionalization of racial disparities and offers wonderful insights into the intersection of race and culture in america

when jimi hendrix died the idea of a black man playing lead guitar in a rock band seemed exotic yet ten years earlier chuck berry had stood among the most influential rock and roll performers why did rock and roll become white jack hamilton challenges the racial categories that distort standard histories of rock music and the 60s revolution

the many lenses of racism through which the white imagination sees mexicans and chicanos historically ideas of whiteness and americanness have been built on the backs of racialized communities the legacy of anti mexican stereotypes stretches back to the early nineteenth century when anglo american settlers first came into regular contact with mexico and mexicans the images of the mexican other as lawless exotic or non industrious continue to circulate today within us popular and political culture through keen analysis of music film literature and us politics whiteness on the border demonstrates how contemporary representations of mexicans and chicanos are pushed further to foster the idea of whiteness as americanness illustrating how the ideologies stories and images of racial hierarchy align with and support those of fervent us nationalism lee beabout maps the relationship between whiteness and american exceptionalism he examines how renderings of the mexican other

have expressed white fear and formed a besieged solidarity in anti immigrant rhetoric and policies moreover whiteness on the border elucidates how seemingly positive representations of mexico and chicano as are actually used to reinforce investments in white american goodness and obscure systems of racial inequality whiteness on the border pushes readers to consider how the racial logic of the past continues to thrive in the present

human beings tend to romanticize history or idealize historical figures this is nowhere more apparent than the civil rights era of the twentieth century the problem is that when we idealize history we fail to learn from it the result is that history repeats itself along with its sins and atrocities the january 6 capitol insurrection and the current racial reckoning we are experiencing is unoriginal to the american experience we have been here before this book seeks to humanize people we have idealized readers are invited to challenge racial hatred and injustice in their own context by looking to the lives of historical figures who have faced the challenges we currently face by examining the self care practices of personalities like ida b wells fannie lou hamer benjamin elijah mays and martin luther king jr this book examines the practices of introspection and self work these historical figures engaged in that enabled them to fulfill the body of work they are celebrated for today by humanizing these historical titans we can emulate similar practices of self care and introspection in our own lives that can equip us in continuing the ongoing work of dismantling structures of racial hatred and oppression and promoting freedom love equity and justice to redeem the soul of a nation

masks is an archaeology of the racial imagination exploring the work of both black and white artists and writers it shows how the racist belief in innate intellectual and moral difference developed from the classificatory sciences of the enlightenment it also questions the more opaque racism of integration where professed ideas of equal so often mean like us lively places these two tendencies against an existential definition of blackness which has come mostly from black writers themselves in his penetrating study adam lively looks closely at eighteenth century novels jazz and rap propagandist verse the trickster tales of slaves and their autobiographical narratives the science of darwin and fictions of blood and empire examining the harlem renaissance in the 1920s the black arts movement of the 1960s and the effects of black feminism he argues that only by understanding the complex evolution of present attitudes can we understand the impact of race on our imaginations and on our lives

president donald trump originated his political career by claiming that barack obama was not born in the usa his birtherism theory was discredited but there's another possibility about birth evangelicals have given birth to donald trump in the immaculate mistake evangelicals are

not a collection of dumb and irrational people they are the creators of the demolition presidency of trump he is their child the result of almost one hundred years of evangelical angst resentment and hurt this is the story of how trump has become a secular evangelical preacher and his message of fear hatred division and getting even has captured the hearts and minds of evangelicals rather than dismissing them this work takes them seriously and literally and offers a frank and disturbing series of portraits of their determination to win at all costs

rock and roll music i argue did not become white as a result of the music that people made but rather as a result of discursive forces that surrounded celebrated and too often drowned out the music that people heard

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although the phrase the american dream dates from the 1930s the concept or idea of the american dream is as old as the country the values proclaimed in the declaration of independence and reaffirmed and extended in the gettysburg address have been continuously promoted by every american president moreover they form the basis of our national collective narrative as expressed through both elite and popular culture the american dream is intrinsically tied to the american creed and american exceptionalism it is the foundation of our national identity the glue that holds together our individual aspirations yet until the mid twentieth century the american dream excluded african americans we as a nation as an imagined community could not imagine an integrated multiracial society with blacks and whites living together as equals by examining the lives of the only three african american nobel peace prize winners we can see how their lives were shaped by the american dream and how their success was used to deny the structural racism that prevented others from achieving the american dream ralph bunche as a role model of academic and technical expertise martin luther king jr as a model race leader and barack obama as a political leader provide a window on the changing meaning of the american dream in conclusion haiti is presented as a failed example of an attempt to export the american dream in the form of american exceptionalism and racial reparations are reimagined as a radical democratic project aimed at true global integration and justice

domesticating brown interrogates the slippery senses that brownness as a racial form has manifested over time charting its transitions across historical colonial contexts and into the transpacific dynamics of contemporary empire christopher b patterson rethinks universalist definitions of race to consider the constant movements in racial contexts meanings and practices that brownness reveals as a site for the ungovernable brown mass as peoples marked for domestication through strategies of colonial containment and as the complex shades that reveal troubling genealogies and shameful intimacies tracing the emergences and

transformations of brownness in various contexts of transpacific encounter from the mongol empire to filipino plantation migration in hawai i from the imperial management of hong kong to contemporary brown authorship domesticating brown explores how colonial subjects and other marginalized peoples have strategized ways of resisting and reversing dominating notions of brownness through art story and embodied difference

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
